

## SHAPE-ID Annotated Bibliography of Policy Literature

**Introduction**

This short bibliography includes some key recent policy reports and statements on inter- and trans-disciplinary research. It is an introduction to a large literature rather than an exhaustive list, and follows SHAPE-ID's overall focus in highlighting resources with a particular relevance to increasing the participation of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences (AHSS) researchers in such research.

- The 2016 *Crossing Paths* report from the British Academy focuses on how academics can forge interdisciplinary careers and whether the right structures are in place to support interdisciplinarity across the research and higher education system. <https://www.thebritishacademy.ac.uk/publications/crossing-paths/>

- The EC has set targets for integration of the Humanities and Social Sciences in inter- and trans-disciplinary Horizon 2020 funded projects, including those addressing societal challenges. - INTREPID was a 32-country network aiming to better understand how to achieve more efficient and effective interdisciplinary research in Europe. - In 2014 a group of high profile research organisations released the Leiden Statement on the role of the Social Science and Humanities in global research, arguing that these disciplines are 'indispensable to understanding and addressing contemporary global challenges and to grasping emerging opportunities'. <https://www.leru.org/files/Leiden-Statement-Full-paper.pdf>
- The League for European Research Universities (LERU) has published two important reports in this area. One outlines the benefits of partnerships
